

Amateur Radio "DXing"

Amateur radio operators who specialize in making two way radio contact with other amateurs in distant countries are referred to as "DXers". On the HF amateur bands, DX stations are those in foreign countries. On the VHF/UHF amateur bands, DX stations can be within the same country or continent, since making a long-distance VHF contact, without the help of a satellite, can be very difficult.

DXers collect QSL cards as proof of contact and can earn special certificates and awards from amateur radio organizations.

DXing versus Contesting

 Pure **DXers** relish the ensuing QSO as much as, or even more than, the chase.

• **DX Contesting** is focused on making as many contacts as possible in a limited time. As a result, the QSO is as brief as possible.

It's OK to do one, the other, or both.

What equipment you need to work HF DX?

- HF rig @100w CW/Phone or @35w Digital (digital modes also require a computer and free software)
- 'Good' Antennae
 If it is getting the job done, then it's good!
- Good operating habits, manners, and ethics

Patience

DX Code of Conduct

- I will listen, and listen, and then listen again before calling.
- I will only call if I can copy the DX station properly.
- I will not trust the DX cluster and will be sure of the DX station's call sign before calling.
- I will not interfere with the DX station nor anyone calling and will never tune up on the DX frequency or in the QSX slot.
- I will wait for the DX station to end a contact before I call.
- I will always send my full call sign.
- I will call and then listen for a reasonable interval. I will not call continuously.

- I will not transmit when the DX operator calls another call sign, not mine.
- I will not transmit when the DX operator queries a call sign not like mine.
- I will not transmit when the DX station requests geographic areas other than mine.
- When the DX operator calls me, I will not repeat my call sign unless I think he has copied it incorrectly.
- I will be thankful if and when I do make a contact.
- I will respect my fellow hams and conduct myself so as to earn their respect.

DX Windows

 By Gentlemans Agreement certain frequencies are used to establish DX contacts. These can differ by ITU Zone and Country. When in doubt, check it out.

DXCC

- In October 1935 Clinton B. DeSoto, Assistant to the Secretary, A.R.R.L., wrote an article for QST entitled "How to Count Countries Worked: A New DX Scoring System." This article became the basis for the DXCC program that we know today.
- The basic rule is simple and direct: Each discrete geographical or political entity is considered to be an entity.



FFMA

- The Fred Fish Memorial Award was created in honor of Fred Fish, W5FF (SK), who is the first amateur to have worked and confirmed all 488 Maidenhead grid squares in the 48 contiguous United States on 6 Meters. The award will be given to any amateur who can duplicate W5FF's accomplishment.
- Only 5 FFMA certificates have been issued.
- This award also encourages operation on the VHF bands from rare grid squares (known as Grid DXpedtitions) to help activate all 488 grids.
